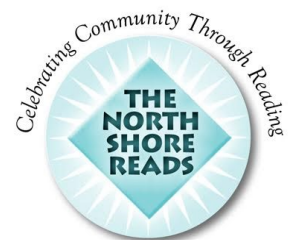

DREADFUL ACCIDENT

Glen Cove, Tuesday Evening, Feb 8th 1853 *continued...*

Gabriel Tenbroeck, had his wrist fractured.

D- - - - Borum had his ankle dislocated and was otherwise injured.

John W. Campbell, received a sever cut over his eye and was considerable bruised.

Jonathan Baldwin had his shoulder sprained and was bruised about the head.

Charles Underhill, Jr. had his collar bone broken.

Amos Merrit, of Oak Neck, had two ribs broken and his shoulders dislocated.

William Mudge had his leg broken and at the time of going to press he felt comparatively - - - .

James Wanser, a lad, had his arm hurt, head bruised and was otherwise considerably harmed.

Treat Watkins, had his arm broken ad was badly bruised.

Samuel Frost, had his leg badly fractured.

Willet Merritt, was badly cut on the head.

Washington Merritt, badly bruised about the head and body.

Rufus Doxy, of Buckram, was badly burned about the head and was also scalded.

Henry Wanser, Senr. Of Oak Neck, bruised badly and seriously injured internally.

Joshua Kirk, badly bruised.
